William Penn Elementary's "Tray Trouble"

This month we want to highlight William Penn Elementary School's "Tray Trouble" group and their years-long effort to replace the Styrofoam trays in their school's cafeteria with a more sustainable option. Team Tray Trouble includes Emeline, Mason M., Mason S., Maya, Skylar, Sophia, Tyrian, Wren, and advisor Ms. Ashley Schellhaas. When the members were in 2nd grade, Skylar was working on a project for which the class was asked to persuade someone to do something. "I decided to look at problems with our school and eventually came across the trays," Skylar says. Other students who heard about this issue got on board, and Tray Trouble was born.



Asked what advice they would have for other students who might want to make something similar happen at their school, the students emphasized the importance of patience and persistence. "It might take a while, and there's a lot of trial and error. You might have to try different things, but it's all worth it in the end," Wren said. "Don't give up," Mason echoed. "When we were doing this I remember being told many times 'no that's not possible'." No matter what, just "try to keep going," Tyrian added. Tray Trouble serves as an inspiring example for other youth as well as adults of what can happen if you stick with something that really matters to you and keep trying until you find a solution that works. Did You Know? In addition to polluting our streets, rivers, and oceans, single-use plastics contribute to greenhouse gas emissions throughout their entire lifecycle - from the fossil fuels they are derived from through their breakdown in the environment. Both Easton and Bethlehem's Climate Action Plans call out reducing or eliminating single-use plastics as an important strategy for emissions reduction.


What is CREATE Connections?

While we have been working on local climate action at the Nurture Nature Center (NNC) for several years, we just recently received federal funding from NOAA's Environmental Literacy Program for our current climate outreach and engagement project, CREATE Connections. More Ways to Take Action

- Join a community clean-up!
 - Easton EAC hosts monthly Wednesday and Saturday clean-ups check their <u>Facebook page</u> for details
 - Southside Bethlehem's Public and Green Space Committee hosts monthly clean-ups see dates and times and register here.
 - Check if there's an organization in your community that offers a clean-up. If not, consider organizing one with a group you are part of!
- Attend a meeting of your local Environmental Advisory Council (EAC):

- <u>Easton EAC</u> 6pm on the first Tuesday of each month at City Hall, City Council Chambers or the Mayor's Conference Room and on Zoom
- <u>Bethlehem EAC</u> 7pm on the first Thursday of each month at Northampton Community College Fowler Family Southside Center, Room 106 and on Zoom
- Smaller municipalities consult your township or borough's website for information on whether you
 have an EAC and when they meet
- All Bethlehem residents: Become a Bethlehem Climate Champion by taking the linked survey to commit to one or multiple climate actions. After completing the survey, participants can pick up their Climate Challenge yard sign from the front desk in City Hall and will have their names added to a list of Climate Champions on the challenge website.
- Business owners in Bethlehem or Easton: Take this 5-10 minute survey to help inform and connect with the CREATE Connections project and support sustainability and climate action in your community.
- Do you know a high school student interested in climate action, sustainability, and/or getting involved in their community? Building on the energy from our recent Youth Climate Summit, the Nurture Nature Center is working to develop a year-round youth climate action and leadership program, and we need student feedback on what it should look like! Students can indicate their interest and share ideas here.
